Transforming Lives

Middle Tennessee has a robust network of nonprofit organizations dedicated to transforming the lives of older adults. The West End Home Foundation provided grant funding to thirty-four agencies in 2021 and partnered with many others. Faced with ever-increasing challenges including supply chain issues, staffing shortages, reduced availability of volunteers and continued restrictions on in-person programming, these organizations never lost their unwavering spirit and relentless determination.

The 2021 Grant award recipients are presented on the next page. Each of these organizations is doing exceptional work and providing critically needed services. Our funding reflects a commitment to core basic needs but also promotes innovation and collaboration to create new models of care and service delivery.

Here are just a few examples of new and innovative work supported by the Foundation's 2021 grant funding:

Vanderbilt University Medical Center

implemented the Age-Friendly Health Systems model which is a nationally acclaimed initiative of the John A. Hartford Foundation and the Institute for Healthcare Improvement, in partnership with the American Hospital Association and the Catholic Health Association. The care delivery model incorporates four evidence-based elements of high quality care known as the 4Ms—Mentation, Medication, Mobility and What Matters Most. Vanderbilt's Acute Care of Elderly (ACE) unit became the first hospital unit in Tennessee to receive Age-Friendly Health Systems accreditation.

The Nashville Public Library Foundation

focused on improving the telehealth readiness of Nashville's older adults through the Telehealth for Older Adults Program. This program won a National Top Innovator Award from the Urban Libraries Council.

Rebuilding Together Nashville continued its multi-year initiative to rehab homes of low-income homeowners in the Bordeaux community, preserving affordable housing stock and allowing older adults to age in community and maintain their generational wealth. A total of 65 homes will be impacted.

Urban Housing Solutions opened the 26th and Clarksville Intergenerational Arts Inspired Community in late 2020, providing 55 affordable rental apartments for persons age 62+. In addition to intergenerational programming and ongoing support services provided by multiple partners, the older residents have access to a health and wellness program called AFRESH (Aging and Frailty: Resilience and Energy in the Second Half of Life). This program provides coaching and education to promote successful independent living.

AgeWell Middle Tennessee and Tennessee
Justice Center, in partnership with the
TN Coalition for Better Aging and the
West End Home Foundation, launched a
statewide advocacy initiative, "Reimagining
Long-Term Services and Supports" to
explore new models for providing home
and community-based long-term care
services. The initiative seeks to increase
capacity, affordability and quality of care
through meaningful systems change.



SeniorTrust Statewide Grant Program -

The State of TN received what became a windfall for older adults when it recovered \$40 million from the dissolution of two nursing homes. The funds were under the auspices of the Chancery Court of Davidson County with Chancellor Ellen Hobbs Lyle presiding. In 2016, The Court appointed a SeniorTrust Consortium comprised of leaders of The West End Home Foundation, Memorial Foundation, HCA Foundation, Assisi Foundation of Memphis and the United Way of Greater Knoxville, to serve in an advisory capacity on the design and implementation of a statewide grant program targeting Tennesseans age 60+. The Tennessee Commission on Aging and Disability administered the program.

Four statewide initiatives have been operating since 2018 and have served tens of thousands of older Tennesseans, improving oral health, providing home repairs and mobility modifications, resolving legal issues and providing transportation. The four initiatives were led by the following organizations:

- SmileOn 60+ Interfaith Dental
- Aging in Place Habitat for Humanity of Greater Memphis and the Westminster Home Connection
- Tennessee Senior Law Alliance Tennessee Alliance for Legal Services
- **Tennessee Senior Volunteer Transportation Network** Southwest TN Development District









Bridging the Digital Divide

In late 2021, The West End Home Foundation was selected as the recipient for the remaining SeniorTrust fund balance of approximately \$3.9M. The funds have been designated for a one-time statewide grant program: *Reducing Social Isolation and Increasing Access to Essential Services through Digital Literacy and Inclusion for Older Tennesseans*. The West End Home Foundation, in partnership with the SeniorTrust Consortium, will launch the request for proposals in early 2022 and will make grant awards by mid-year.

The SeniorTrust Grant funds have significantly enhanced multiple systems of care for older adults and will continue to have far-reaching impact. The West End Home Foundation is honored to be a partner in this transformational work.
